# The 2024-2025 state budget

#### The Landscape

- One year since PA's school funding system
  was declared unconstitutional by
  Commonwealth Court and the judge
  ordered respondents to come up with a plan.
- Basic Education Funding Commission issued a report with a 7-year plan to close \$5.4 billion funding gap to reach constitutional compliance.
- Pennsylvania has \$14 BILLION year-end surplus, including \$6 billion in a rainy day fund and \$8 billion year-end surplus.



#### Basic Education Funding

# \$1,072,000,000 increase in BEF Adequacy Investments

- \$736,000,000 targeted to school districts that are inadequately funded
- \$136,000,000 targeted to school districts with high property taxes to promote tax equity

The two investments will meet the first-year investment (of seven) recommended by the BEFC to address Pennsylvania's unconstitutional school funding system.



#### Basic Education Funding (con't)

- \$200 million for all 500 school districts through the basic education funding line
- This investment also follows the recommendation of the BEFC

The BEFC recommended updating the current funding formula improve predictability and stability of funding.

These included smoothing the poverty factors and resetting the BEF base to the 2023-24 allocation.

With this investment, total funding for basic education would reach \$8,944,000,000.

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# Special Education Funding

\$50 million increase in special education funding, a 4% increase over FY 2023-24.



#### Career Tech & Dual Enrollment Funding

\$2.4 million increase for career and technical education, a 2% increase over FY 2023-24.

\$7 million for dual enrollment programs.



#### Cyber Charter Savings

#### **Cyber Charter School Funding Reform**

The Governor proposes establishing a statewide cyber charter tuition rate of \$8,000 per student per year (current range is \$8,639 - \$26,564 per student per year).

The special education rate remains unchanged.

Enacting this reform is estimated to <u>save school</u> <u>districts</u> \$262,000,000 annually.

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# **School Construction**

#### Free Breakfast

#### **Department of Education**

#### \$300,000,000 for the School Environmental Repairs Program.

- This program was created in FY 2023-24 and shifted to the Department of Education pursuant to Act 34 of 2023.

#### \$16,667,000 increase in School Food Services

 This increase continues funding for initiatives, including the universal free breakfast program adopted as part of the FY 2023-24 budget.



# Period Products

#### **Department of Health**

\$3,000,000 increase for School District Health Services to provide feminine hygiene products at no cost to students in schools.

- Nationally, 1 in 4 teens have missed class due to a lack of access to menstrual hygiene supplies.
- Schools will be able to purchase product dispensation devices as one-time purchases and procure hygiene products on an ongoing basis to be made readily available to students.



#### School Safety and Mental Health

# Pennsylvania Commission on Crime & Delinquency

\$161,700,000 distributed by the PCCD's School Safety & Security Committee:

- \$100 million for K-12 Mental Health
  - General Fund dollars replace federal ARPA funds used in FY 2023-24
- \$50 million for School Safety and Security
  - Funding for physical upgrades or mental health services for school entities



#### Teacher Supports

#### **Department of Education**

\$28 million in funding to support teacher recruitment and retention and professional development.



#### **Pre-K Funding**

#### \$32,700,000 increase for Pre-K Programs

- \$30,000,000 for Pre-K Counts, an 11% increase over FY 2023-24
- \$2,700,000 for Head Start, a 3% increase over FY 2023-24
- \$17,000,000 increase for Early
   Intervention, a 5% increase over FY 2023 24



# Higher Education

#### **Department of Education**

A new <u>Blueprint for Higher Education</u> and substantial funding increases.

We are awaiting additional details on the proposal.



#### K-12 Proposal Has Benefits for ALL DISTRICTS!

- Districts most harmed by unconstitutional state funding will receive substantial adequacy investments that will begin to close their funding gaps and/or recognizes their high tax effort.
- Districts with declining enrollment that benefit from hold harmless will have their base reset, which provides stability moving forward and removes the threat of losing funding if BEF is redistributed through the formula.
- Cyber charter reform will return \$262 million to ALL districts and help keep cyber charter costs controlled moving forward.

And look, one of those conversations will need to be about scholarships that let poor families in struggling school districts put their kids in the best position for them to succeed – whether that's paying for extra tutoring, books and computers, or yes, going to another school.

The Senate passed a proposal last year that included important elements of that, and it's something I support and consider to be unfinished business.

I'm grateful House Democratic Leadership has committed to examine and seriously consider this proposal to address the needs of our most at-risk learners.

So, we've left room for the House and Senate to find common ground on this.

Every dollar spent on a school voucher reduces funding available to fund public schools.

PA ALREADY spends \$490 million/year on vouchers for unaccountable, discriminatory private schools through the Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) and Opportunity Scholarship Tax Credit (OSTC) programs.
