Background

- Governor Josh Shapiro is facing pressure from private school voucher supporters to opt into Trump's federal school voucher program, which included in the "One Big Beautiful Bill Act," enacted on July 4, 2025. However, many questions remain about how the federal voucher program will work, who will benefit from it, and what mechanisms will be in place to prevent the waste, fraud, and abuse of tax dollars through these programs.
- An invitation-only preview from the U.S. Department of the Treasury and the U.S. Department of Education on June 9, 2026, focused on some of the policy decisions that will be included in draft regulations for the program, which are expected to be released no later than the end of September.

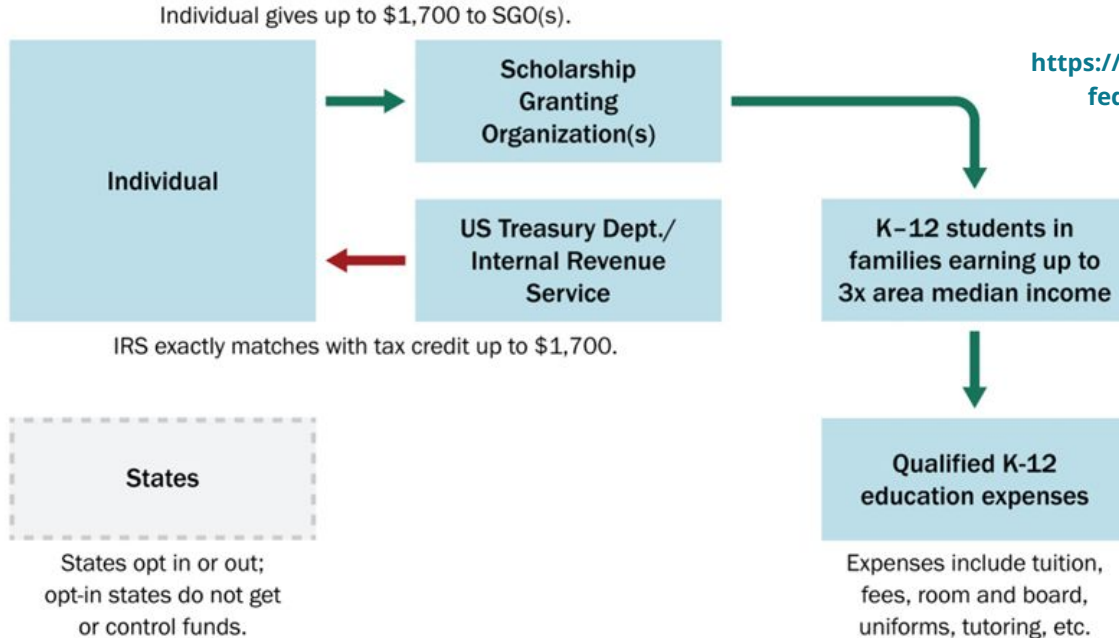


The Trump Federal Tax Credit Scholarship Program is a voucher program funded with tax dollars diverted from the federal Treasury.

- This program provides a dollar-for-dollar federal tax credit up to \$1,700 for taxpayer contributions to Scholarship Granting Organizations (SGOs) that distribute vouchers. Governors must actively opt their states into the program annually to participate.
- The Trump school voucher program will direct money out of the US Treasury and into private and religious schools and the private intermediary organizations that funnel money to them. The dollars that will fund vouchers will be unavailable to fund public education.
- The program begins in January 2027, when SGOs may begin collecting contributions from individuals participating in the program. Contributors to the program will receive a tax credit on the taxes they file in 2028.

Requirements for SGOs

- Must be a 501c3, nonprofit organization.
- Must be located in the state where the SGO operates, although Treasury may allow out-of-state/multi-state SGOs.
- SGOs must award 90% of the funds to 10 or more K-12 students. At least two of these students must attend different schools.
- SGOs determine how much money to allocate to each student. They could award \$100 or \$50,000 to an individual student.



Pennsylvania would likely NOT have any influence on how the program will be administered if Gov. Shapiro opts in.

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States will likely not be able to restrict federal voucher funds to students with the greatest financial need or align income eligibility with current state tax credit voucher programs.

The federal family income eligibility thresholds will be limited to households with incomes **not greater than 300% of the area's median gross income.**

[An Ed Choice analysis](#) finds that family income limits in Pennsylvania range from a low of \$204,000 in Forest County to \$368,100 in Philadelphia and the collar counties.

This income limit far outstrips the income limit used by Pennsylvania's current Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) and Opportunity Scholarship Tax Credit (OSTC) programs, which **restrict scholarships to students whose household's annual income is no greater than \$116,055 plus \$20,428 for each dependent member of the household.**

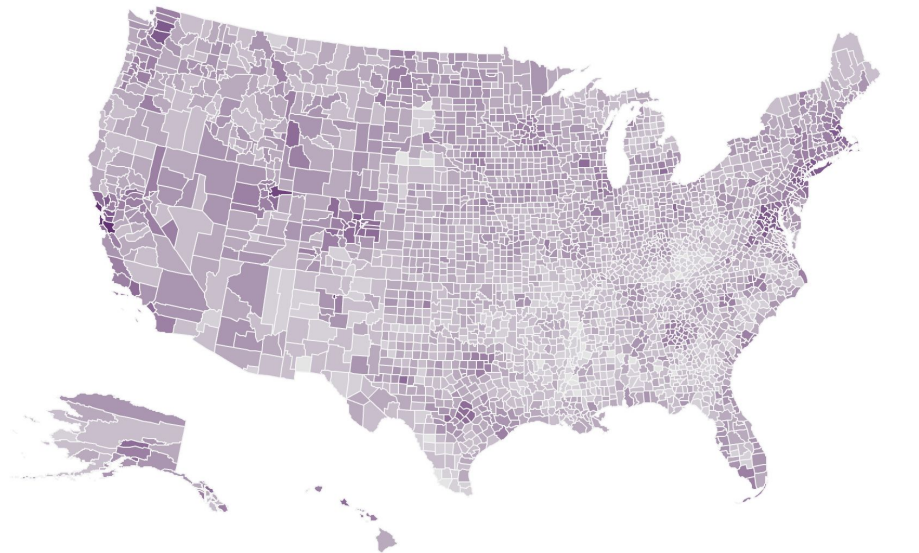

This program is near-universal, meaning that voucher dollars would pay the private school tuition of all but the wealthiest families and will serve as a subsidy for the most privileged students in Pennsylvania.

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We do not know how funds would be disbursed.

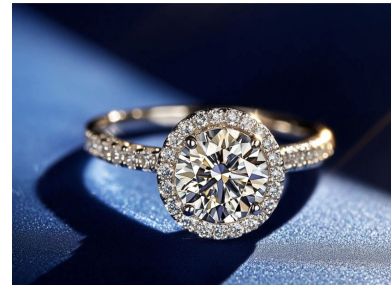
We do not know if money be directed to schools/organizations or given directly to families.

- This question is not answered in the legislation, and it was not addressed in a recent meeting where the Treasury previewed guidance.
- NOTE: In states where families have been given voucher funding directly, fraud and abuse of taxpayer money have been rampant. In Florida, state voucher dollars are used to pay for [tickets to Disney resorts, paddleboards, televisions, and more.](#) In Arizona, school voucher dollars are used to pay for [high-end resorts, plane tickets, lingerie, diamond rings, and an extensive list](#) of things completely unrelated to educating students.



States will NOT be allowed to oversee the spending of Trump school voucher funding to prevent waste, fraud, and abuse.

- The federal law gives states little authority to prevent waste, fraud, and abuse of funding in these programs other than removing SGOs from the state list.
- SGOs, which will be allowed to keep 10% of the funding they receive, will be charged with the auditing and fraud detection of their own operations. This will be a fox guarding the henhouse setup.



These are NOT educational expenses.



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Public Schools Will NOT Receive Funding from the Voucher Program

School districts will not receive funding from this program.

Individual public school students may receive funding that will pay for allowable expenses, but school districts will receive no funding from this program.

- **The Trump school voucher program will not function like the Educational Improvement Organization (EIO) program**, which is part of Pennsylvania's Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) program, where organizations are allowed to fund programming and services that benefit students in school districts as a whole.
- Funding will be designated as a voucher for a specific student to cover specific costs.
- To receive voucher funding through this program, each student's family income must be verified.



The language for what can be paid for with voucher dollars is specific to Coverdell expenses, which include:

- Tuition and fees,
- Books, supplies, and equipment,
- Academic tutoring,
- Special needs services for a special needs beneficiary,
- Room and board,
- Uniforms,
- Transportation,
- Supplementary items and services (including extended day programs), and
- Computer equipment that is used by the beneficiary and the beneficiary's family during any of the years the beneficiary is in elementary or secondary school.

****In Pennsylvania's public schools, most of these expenses are already included as part of public education. Families are not charged for these expenses and would not be eligible for a voucher if they have no out-of-pocket expenses.**



School district foundations will most likely need a new 501(c)(3) to accept federal voucher dollars.

- SGOs must spend at least 90% of their income on scholarships for eligible students.
- The U.S. Treasury generally plans to calculate the 90% requirement using an organization's total income.
- Organizations that are primarily scholarship-granting may qualify for a "safe harbor," allowing only federal voucher contributions held in a segregated account to count toward the 90% calculation.

“Existing organizations hoping to serve as SGOs that are not “largely” focused on awarding student scholarships would not be able to take advantage of that safe harbor; they would likely need to establish a new 501(c)(3) focused on scholarships that can more easily satisfy the 90% rule.”

We know very little about what financial information will families have to share.

- Families' income must be verified to qualify for federal voucher funding.
- It is still unknown what documents or financial information families will be required to provide.
- It is also unclear which vendors will handle this information or what privacy safeguards will be in place to protect it.



Federal voucher dollars will be used to fund private and religious schools that discriminate against students.

States will not be allowed to prohibit federal voucher dollars from funding private and religious schools that discriminate against their students or employees because of their disability, religion, academics, LGBTQ+ status, pregnancy or abortion, or a school's subjective determination of whether a student is the "right fit" for the school or not.

Only public schools educate all students who come through their doors. Private schools choose the students they educate.

PENNSYLVANIA VOUCHER SCHOOLS USE TAX DOLLARS TO ADVANCE DISCRIMINATION

Private and religious schools that receive tax dollars through Pennsylvania's \$340 million/year Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) and Opportunity Scholarship Tax Credit (OSTC) school voucher programs publicly promote policies that explicitly discriminate against students.

Governor Josh Shapiro has a strong record of inclusion and fighting discrimination. Voucher programs do not create educational "choice," they create the illusion of "choice," while using tax dollars to fund private and religious schools that discriminate.

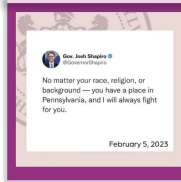
All of the schools with policies highlighted here are currently participating in the Opportunity Scholarship Tax Credit (OSTC) program.

Unlike PA public schools, voucher schools do not serve every student. Instead, voucher schools pick and choose the students they enroll.



"Thus, DAYSPRING CHRISTIAN ACADEMY retains the right to refuse enrollment to or to expel any student who engages in sexual immorality, including any student who professes to be homosexual/bisexual/transgender or is a practicing homosexual/bisexual/transgender, as well as any student who condones, supports, or otherwise promotes such practices (Leviticus 20:13, Romans 1:27). Many voucher schools that receive tax dollars engage in blatant and explicit discrimination against students because of their religious beliefs, academics, disability, LGBTQ+ status, pregnancy or abortion, and more.

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The costs could be substantial for Pennsylvania taxpayers to set up and administer the Trump school voucher program.

While we don't know the exact costs we can compare the costs of other states who have already opted into this program.

For example, the Florida legislature has allocated [\\$2 million to the Florida Department of Education](#) to develop an administrative platform for the Trump school voucher program. This does not include funding for recurring costs that will be required to administer the program each year.

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Who is best positioned to take advantage of Trump's voucher program?

To have a federal tax liability of \$1700 that can be redirected into the Trump school voucher program, individuals will need to have [an adjusted gross income of approximately \\$85,000.](#) Individuals with tax liabilities that are less than \$1700 can participate in the program and make contributions equal to their tax liability.

Communities where there are many wealthy individuals who have large federal tax liabilities will be target rich environments for SGOs seeking contributors to the Trump school voucher program.

Low-income communities will have far fewer individuals with tax liabilities to redirect to the voucher program. In addition, individuals who are living paycheck-to-paycheck will not have the luxury of making a contribution to an SGO in one fiscal year and waiting until the next fiscal year to receive a credit on their tax bill for the contribution.



Potential participation in Trump's voucher program.

Organizations best positioned to take advantage of the Trump school voucher program:

- Elite private schools that serve affluent families and already have their own scholarship organizations for Pennsylvania's EITC/OSTC programs where these families already make contributions.
- Existing special purpose entities that have lists of wealthy individuals that participate in Pennsylvania EITC/OSTC programs.
- Schools that are connected to churches and churches that start new schools.

Organizations least well positioned to take advantage of the Trump school voucher program:

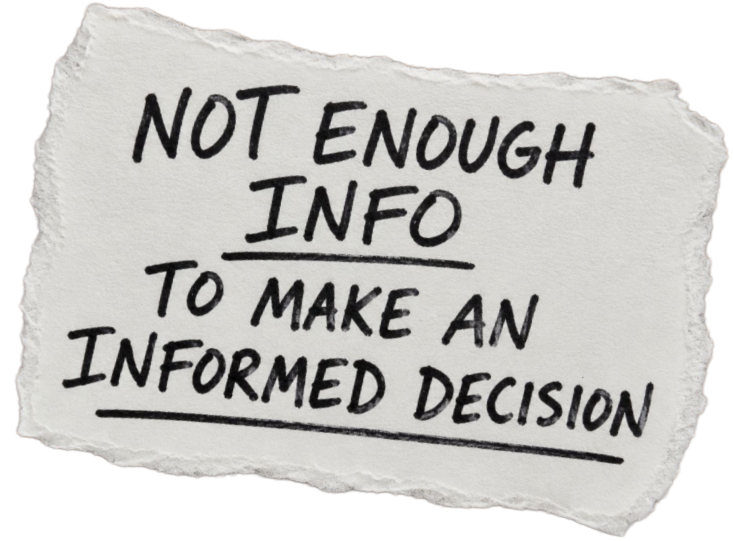
Those seeking to support students in low-income communities where many potential donors and families of children who would benefit from the program have a federal tax liability that is less than \$1700.



The Governor's Decision

The decision Governor Shapiro makes regarding the Trump school voucher program will have enormous, long-lasting ramifications for educational resource allocation and equity in the commonwealth.

Given recent comments from the the U.S. Treasury, it is reasonable to expect that the **proposed** regulations for the Trump school voucher program that will be released in September 2026 will continue to lack clarity on many of the issues described above. Governor Shapiro will have inadequate information to formulate a thorough understanding of the impact that the Trump school voucher program would have on students and on Pennsylvania's education system as a whole.



NOTE

Pennsylvania already has two tax credit voucher programs that divert public dollars to private schools. Since 2001, the Pennsylvania Education Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) and Opportunity Scholarship Tax Credit (OSTC) programs have provided more than \$3.5 billion in vouchers to Pennsylvania students attending private and religious schools.

The programs currently receive \$575 million in annual tax credits to fund private school vouchers. [In the 2024-2025 school year, these programs were undersubscribed by more than \\$115 million,](#)

Scholarship organizations at just 25 of the most exclusive – and most expensive (average high school tuition of \$46,131) – Pennsylvania private schools received more than \$21 million in EITC and OSTC funding in 2024-2025.

Many of these schools receive substantial additional EITC/OSTC funding from Special Purpose Entities (SPEs), whose sole purpose is to obtain Pennsylvania Education Improvement Tax Credits (EITC/OSTC). In 2023-2024 funding for these schools from SPEs totaled more than \$13 million.

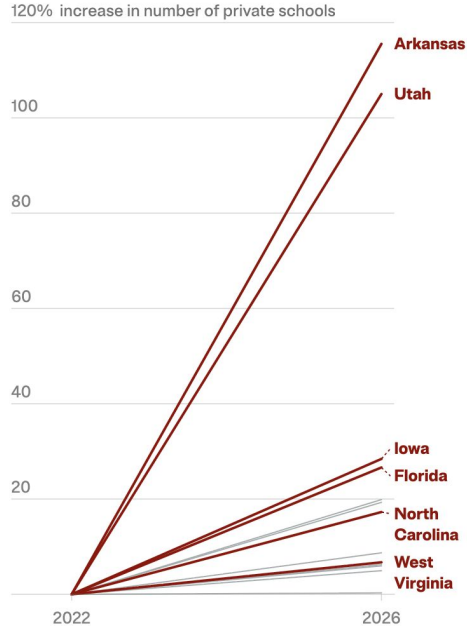

“At her private school just beyond the city limits of Jonesboro, Arkansas, Mary “Tracy” Morrison demanded the attention of the 19 students seated on the floor in a circle. She then directed a skinny 13-year-old boy wearing a cartoon Mario shirt to sit in the center.

“Raise your hand if he’s ever been mean to you — ever,” Morrison, the owner, prompted the other middle schoolers, and some hands shot up.

“Come over here and put your hands on him, however you want,” Morrison told the students.

A boy volunteered. “I’ll do it,” he said, and the other students cheered and clapped.

That student entered the circle, looped his arm around the boy’s neck and choked him. Morrison gave him a high-five. The boy in the center cowered. Then other students took turns slapping, pinching and punching the boy. Morrison picked up a footlong plastic cylinder — it resembled a pipe — and thwacked him over and over, calling him a liar.”

The attack went on for nearly 40 minutes. At the end, Morrison made the boy apologize to his classmates for mistreating them.

“A decade ago, the state of Florida stripped a teacher of her license for sexual abuse of a 16-year-old boy. Last year, she opened a private school there with ease.

Her name and photo were on her new school’s website and details of her case were easy to find with an online search.

The state also knew that a transplanted Midwesterner had been fired from her Cincinnati charter school, following felony charges related to misuse of public funds, and had been banned from teaching or running schools in Ohio. Yet Florida did not stop her from starting a private school and collecting public money.

As private schools proliferate in Florida and across the country, fueled by taxpayer dollars, states are choosing not to closely regulate who is operating them or to oversee student safety and achievement, a ProPublica investigation found.”

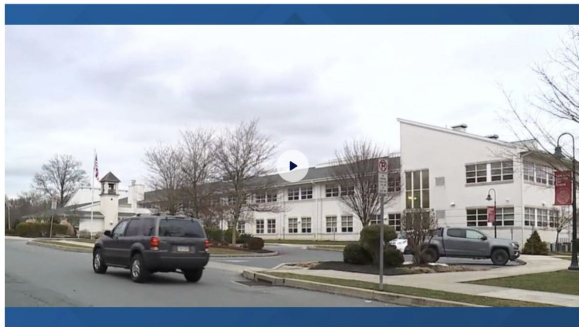

When [Governor Tina Kotek](#) opted Oregon out of the program, she stated, “At this point, I simply cannot trust that any education policy coming from Trump’s White House is in the best interest of Oregon’s kids and our public education system.”

The same can be said for Pennsylvania kids and our public education system.
